



Art on the Move

WHOLE GALLERY EXHIBITION

Gallery M comes alive this month with unique arty vehicles, mobile artworks that have been created to take part in a funky Street Parade on 1 April. The parade is the focal point for the biennial 'Marion Celebrates' Festival, the biggest community event in the City of Marion.

The artwork, and comprehensive support material documenting the project will be on display prior to the event, but the artwork will leave the gallery for the parade from 11.30am – 12.30pm. It will then return and be on display in the gallery until the conclusion of the exhibition on 15 April.

Various communities have been involved in the project, constructing their amazing means of transport under the supervision of artists Lawrence Wilkes and Leigh Corrigan. The communities include Baha'i, Hindu Temple, and Filipino, as well as students from Hamilton High School.

The Baha'i group have made a spectacular boat, that is perched atop a globe of the world. Reminiscent of 'Noah's Ark', it reminds us that all races need to come together to take care of our world.

Another astounding configuration is a life-sized ox, or 'caribou', pulling a cart of super sized paper maché fruits and vegetables. This has been created by the Filipino community, with the fibreglass coated ox constructed by René and his team. The cart has been painted to liken bamboo, and represents an alternative form of transport that is still often used in the Philippines.

Also from the Filipino group is an exquisite bird, constructed of paper and cane by Norma Hennessy. Environmental issues

again come to mind, with this delicate form drawing attention to the ominous plight of birds and animals in this era of global warming.

A beautifully decorated 'Dolie' or bridal carriage has been made by the Hindu community. Traditionally, the bride is carried to her wedding in the Dolie, which is usually carried on the shoulders of her supporters. A bride, in traditional dress will travel in this during the parade, and the Dolie has been given wheels to allow ease of movement.

Another construction by the Hindu community is the Dancing Horse of Rajasthan, India – inspired by the thought of the horse as transport, as well as from the Kachhi Ghorri Dance. This is virtually a battle dance, in which riders of cloth or paper horses demonstrate the use of the sword and shield. Neena, Shantanu and Jasmine from the Hindu community used bamboo, wire and paper maché to create the horse, which has been embellished with beautiful material and decorations.

Students of Hamilton High School have created a quirky bus, that will be pulled along by a four-wheeled cycle. This fun exhibit is a bit like a 'hippy Kombi van' – with figures inside and surfboards on top.

The documentation of the project will give a unique insight into the planning and construction of these wonderful mobile artworks. It will also acknowledge the many people who worked together to make this project such a success.
